The chicks are growing up!




At first, a penguin chick looks like a little grey ball of fluff with a beak!


Tough bristly mane protects the tapir's neck from jaquar bites!

Thick skin protects from bites and scratches

Small deep set eyes are protected from thorns and branches

Long bendy nose can reach up to pick leaves to eat

When swimming underwater the tapir can stick his nose out like a snorkel!



Four toes on each front foot and three on each back foot

NOOO! Brazilian tapirs are classed as "vulnerable" which means they might soon be an endangered species. This is because of hunting and because their forests are being cut down-

Animal of the Week

Brazilian Tapir

Somtimes people think that tapirs are a type of wild pig, but they are wrong! Tapirs are acutally related to horses and rhinoceroses.

A mother tapir hides her baby calf in the bushes for safety while she goes in search of food. Babies have a stripy pattern for camouflage - Google "baby tapir" to see this.

Habitat

From the tropical forests of South America, they live on the forest floor

Food in the Wild

They are plant eaters (herbivores). They eat mainly leaves, also roots and fruit
